Nillumbik	Currently has no bin inspection program.

	<ul> <li>If a bin is visibly contaminated, Council won't empty it.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>If requested, Council will return once to a bin to empty it once the contaminants have been removed (this gives Council the chance to properly explain what the issue is and provide a fresh start).</li> </ul>

- If contamination is noticed before it is in the hopper then it's left.
- If contamination is minor, Council generally return and collect with a garbage truck.
- If the contamination is major, Council sticker and leave the bin until the resident contacts Council and removes the contaminant – or we empty with garbage truck.
- Bin inspections consist of walking around lifting the lid of each bin in targeted areas of high contamination (obtained through driver records) and place tags (happy / sad faces) on bins.
- Majorly contaminated bins are stickered shut and educational material and place a letter explaining the issue asking the resident to contact Council and discuss are provide.
- Council revisit the same bins (three times) during the program and provide a reward (op shop voucher) to residents that recycle right consecutively.
