From the Chamber

It's been a busy month in the Chamber with several reports attracting significant attention.

These included a report discussed at our 15 May Council Meeting on how to improve safety on Inkerman Street. We put two options out for community consultation so we could hear as many views as possible before making a decision.

After careful consideration, Option B was adopted - an on-road bike lane with painted buffers which requires fewer parking spaces to be removed.



While Option A offered extra safety provisions which could potentially have encouraged more riders, Option B will still make intersections safer and deter dooring by reallocating road space as a buffer between cars.

From official submissions to texts, calls and emails, we heard you all and appreciate everyone who took the time to provide their feedback.

The 1 May meeting also attracted some passionate submissions. We understand that EV vehicle owners face obstacles in charging their cars if they rely on on-street parking so we are doing our best to offer accessible solutions. While we deferred a decision on whether to continue our private kerbside EV charger pilot until we have more information for our 5 June meeting, we are forging

ahead with continuing to explore and install on-street public utility pole-mounted and kerbside EV charger technology.

That meeting also saw another step forward in achieving the goals of our St Kilda Live Music Precinct when we decided to send a proposed planning scheme amendment to the Victorian Planning Minister for permission to prepare and exhibit it. The amendment is about achieving a responsive and flexible balance between a vibrant live music sector and amenity for residents and we are proud to be the first Victorian council working on bringing this framework to life.

A Special Council Meeting this month provided a further opportunity to make submissions on our draft 2024/45 Budget and updated Council Plan. By 9 May, we had received feedback from 200 community members. The community consultation is now closed and all feedback will be provided to Councillors in a final engagement report before we adopt these important documents at our 26 June meeting.

There's some fantastic events and promotions coming up, including the 40th anniversary of our much-anticipated St Kilda Film Festival. Adding to the fun, we are running a competition in this issue of Divercity for a double pass to enjoy the opening night and after party.

This issue also includes how to jump aboard the "Bay City Roller" bus for the inaugural Port Melbourne Music Crawl and the return of Acland Street's delicious sweet treats promotion – do drop by our very own 'dessert precinct'!

Daizie makes reading pawsome

Daizie the dog isn't your average library volunteer. She can't help little hands turn pages or offer up a "well done". But Daizie's pawsome presence is helping Port Phillip primary school children develop into confident, lifelong readers.

The six-year-old Schnauzer is a much loved visitor on Tuesday afternoons at St Kilda Library's free Story Dogs Australia (SDA) sessions. The sessions started after Library Customer Service Officer Andrea devised and set up the program and encouraged her neighbour Sue, a retired dog trainer, to bring Daizie along.

SDA is a non-profit reading support program with two and four-legged volunteers visiting mainly schools and some libraries across Australia. Daizie was the first Story Dog to work in a Victorian library, supporting children to read.

After a playful catch-up with Library staff, Daizie knows it's time to hit the books when Sue pops her into a SDA vest.

"A child struggling with reading can feel self-conscious. With Daizie, there's no judgment which is very calming for young readers," Library Children's and Youth Services Team Leader Monica says.

"Sometimes there is one hand on Daizie and one hand on the book as they practice reading. It's incredibly rewarding to see them become more confident as their reading skills improve every week."

Sue sits nearby as each child reads a book of their choice to Daizie for 15 minutes. "I don't teach children to read, that's not my job, As an SDA volunteer, it's about encouraging children to read. I'll ask questions or provide positive feedback about their progress."

The reward for Sue is seeing children walk away with smiles and a love of reading.

Divercity dropped by to see Daizie enjoying an exciting tale about dragons being read to her confidently by nine-year-old Mateo.

"I like coming as I can read all my favourite books to her," Mateo says, book in one hand with the other patting Daizie.

Mateo's mother Claudia is delighted at how his reading skills have grown since signing up for Story Dogs.

"He didn't use punctuation a lot before, he'd just read out big chunks of information. Now he uses pauses and intonation," Claudia says.

"Sue asks him questions about the story, while Daizie is listening without judgment, so he feels comfortable to stop and think about what he is reading.

"He loves dogs. We don't have one at the moment so we get our puppy fix for the week when we come to see Daizie."

While most children – and adults – in the library are drawn to Daizie, it's not always love at first sight. But just like a fairy tale, there's a happy ending.

"One boy cried during his first session with us and said 'I can't read'. I said 'let's look at the pictures and make a story up.' Now he loves coming," Sue says.

Sue and Monica remember being deeply touched by a heart-felt gift from a young Story Dogs participant.

"Monica asked me to come in as a girl regularly attending Story Dogs had made a gift for Daizie and I. It turned out she wrote a story about us. It was all tied up and had pictures with diamantes on Daizie. I was teary, it was so beautiful."

At the end of the session, Daizie jumps off her blanket and is rewarded with a well-deserved treat from Sue. You get the feeling Daizie would do it for the pats alone - and the fun of hearing stories from her new friends.

"She really is attentive, she'll look up and cock her head," Monica says

"She's like a working dog with words," Sue laughs.

New venues serving it up in South Melbourne

South Melbourne has seen a flurry of new openings lately. From chic rooftop bars with stunning views, to new craft breweries and must-try Italian, add these to your must-visit list.



Lucia, South Melbourne

The team behind suburban gems Riserva, Baia Di Vino and San Lorenzo, has recently opened <u>Lucia</u>, a new Mediterranean restaurant and wine bar in South Melbourne. Located in the Eleven Building on Eastern Road, expect warm, old school hospitality, seasonal dishes and a 400+bottle wine list. The elegant dining space accommodates up to 80 people and there's also marble-clad bar, perfect for casual drop-ins. Headed by Jordan Clavaron, formerly of Cutler and Co, the kitchen presents a diverse menu, from snacks to share plates, from Fremantle octopus skewer with red pepper sauce, beetroot ravioli to a 1 kilgram dry-aged rib-eye steak with chimichurri.

Brewmanity, a new artisan brewery and rooftop bar, has just opened in South Melbourne . Sip on a locally crafted ale while taking in panoramic views on the Next Level rooftop, which accommodates up to 400 guests. With a retractable roof, it is also completely weather proof. On the ground-floor, their industrial-style Beer Hall offers a closer glimpse of the brewing process. The drinks list includes 12 house-made brews and two blenders on tap, Australian wines and classic cocktails. The contempoary food menu caters to a wide range of dietaries with plenty of vegan and glutenfree options. But it's not just about beer and views. Giving back is also an essential part of Brewmanity's mission. A portion of all beer sales goes towards Fight MND, while their 'Sip and Sizzle' initiative offers fundraising opportunities for local community groups. Cheers to that!

Pirate Life, South Melbourne

Acclaimed South Australian brewer, <u>Pirate Life</u>, unveiled its first Melbourne location last month, around the corner from South Melbourne Market. Housed in a revamped mechanics' garage with exposed bricks, greenery and industrial finishes, it has room for up to 220 patrons. There's 14 house brews on tap to try, ranging from the popular South Coast Pale Ale to limited releases like Vanilla Malt Thickshake Nitro IPA. The menu highlights fresh, locally-sourced ingredients, offering market fish, prime meat cuts sold by weight, and bar snacks including wood-fired flatbread, fresh Pacific oysters, and pickled octopus carpaccio.

Mirror Mirror Rooftop Lounge, South Melbourne

A new rooftop bar, Mirror Mirror Rooftop Lounge, recently opened above the historic Clarendon Hotel. The ambiance is impeccable, offering stunning views of the city skyline. A selection of Snow White-themed gin and rum-based cocktails on the drinks list has high novelty value - they're also really good. Get started with the Evil Witch Spritz (Creme de violette, Campari, Iemon, gin, prosecco) or The Huntsman (Bacardi white rum, ginger liqueur, lime and apple). Pair your drink with Asian-inspired dishes such as soft-shell crab, pork dumplings, or the pan-grilled barramundi in Thai-style chili dressing for a perfect summer experience.

Ugo Burrata Bar, South Melbourne

New at South Melbourne Market, <u>Ugo Burrata Bar</u> is a must-visit for foodies craving the classic Italian delight from Puglia – burrata, a creamy blend of mozzarella and cream. Options include burrata with toast (served with avocado, bacon jam, chilli), a bagel (heirloom tomato, chili), or focaccia (eggplant caponata or porchetta). If you prefer burrata as the star, standalone combos like Finnochia (fennel salami, rockmelon, capers, parsley salsa) and Peperonata (braised peppers, basil, breadcrumbs) are also available.

If you are considering running for Council, it's a great idea to read through the Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) candidate page to familiarize yourself with key roles and responsibilities of nominating for council elections.

Candidate Training Sessions

Under the Local Government Act 2020, all candidates for election must attend a candidate training session prior to nominating. If you do not attend a training session, you will not be eligible to nominate.

Saints set to play ball in the Premier League

St Kilda Baseball Club will return to the Victorian Summer Baseball League's (VSBL) Premier League for the first time in 62 years following the Club's State League premiership in March.

The Saints' Firsts team triumphed over Ormond-Glen Huntly, winning 2-0 in the best-of-three grand final series cementing the team's promotion to Victoria's highest baseball division.



St Kilda will now aim to capture its first Premier League premiership since 1953.

St Kilda Baseball Club President Matthew Turnbull spoke to Divercity to share what the big win meant for the club and its former players.

"We had a great show of support from some of our life members who came down to cheer on the team," he said.

"One of the life members burst into tears he was that happy. And these are guys who are in their 70s, 80s and almost 90s who wanted to show their support."

The Saints enjoyed a successful summer season with multiple teams making the finals in their respective divisions. This consistency was rewarded as St Kilda was named as State League Club Champion, an award that recognises the combined success of all teams competing for the Club.

"At the end of the day it's a reflection on the Club as a whole and what we have achieved. It's the cherry on top after taking out the State League premiership and earning the promotion," Turnbull said.

Founded in 1879, St Kilda Baseball Club has a rich history, including being recognised as Australia's oldest baseball club. The team was one of the founding clubs of the Victorian Baseball League which formed in 1890.

"The Club was formed initially to play against the American navy when they would arrive by ship and dock in Melbourne," Turnbull said.

"People would see the Americans playing baseball and join in until our Club was formed to be the main team to play against the navy."

Turnbull said the Club is proud of its history but also has a keen eye on a promising future.

"We have all of our premiership flags displayed in our clubhouse and they all hang from the walls," he said.

"We have quite a few flags from the minor divisions but at the end of the day we want that top Premier League flag.

"Baseball may not be the biggest sport, but we've got a proud history. It's an exciting time for the Club and we can't wait to see where we go."

St Kilda Baseball Club is based in Albert Park and features men's, women's and junior teams welcoming players of all abilities and ages.

 Community Service permits valid from 1 November 30 April to a year-round permit. This includes reducing the fees and increasing the cap for Lifesaving Clubs in Port Phillip.

Golden moment for South Melbourne Life Saving Club

South Melbourne Life Saving Club has taken out two gold medals at the Australian Surf Life Saving Championships.

Known as the Aussies, the youth championships were held on the Sunshine Coast in April. Millie Andrich, Katherine Hargest, Lexi Lamrock, Aurora McBride and Silvana Mandile won the



5-person rescue and resuscitation (R & R) event. Aurora and Silvana also took gold in the 2-person R & R competition.

R & R is a competition based on the simulated rescue and resuscitation of a patient from the surf using the traditional belt and reel.
