## From the Chamber

It's been wonderful seeing women's sport receive the attention it deserves, from the mighty Matildas to our very own Port Melbourne Football Club's women's team.

I was among the many supporters cheering the Port women on in their first VFLW Grand Final and couldn't have been prouder when they took home the silverware after a thrilling match against Collingwood.

Female participation in sport is undeniably increasing, spurred on by talented teams like these. In fact, this is part of strong overall growing demand for our already at capacity open spaces, from sporting clubs to residents including dog owners.

Our concerns about Victorian Government inaction on Fishermans Bend go wider than open space alone. These include Infrastructure promises, such as Metro Rail, also not being delivered as promised.

It's imperative these commitments, based on collaboration with our Council and community, are delivered urgently as more than 80,000 people are expected to live and work in Fishermans Bend by 2050 and these services and open space are already needed now.

This is why we are asking you to join us in telling the Victorian Government it must live up to the commitments our community wants and expects. Full details are in this edition of Divercity.



There was a packed public gallery in the Chamber when we discussed whether to take up the option of making a protected kerbside bike lane for Kerferd Road an advocacy priority.

While we ultimately decided against this, our Council will still make a submission to the Victorian Government's draft Shrine to Sea Masterplan community consultation on other matters relating to this project. This will include support for biodiversity in the median corridor, improvements to the Kerferd Road Pier Forecourt including extra shade, seating, bike parking, safer crossings at Kings Way and Moray Street and safety improvements at the Albert Road / Kerferd Road underpass.

We understand there are very strong, opposing views about the bike lane and thank everyone who has contacted us with their feedback and suggestions. We commit to hearing all voices and will call for a full and transparent consultation when the Victorian Government revisits considering a protected bike lane separately from its Shrine to Sea Masterplan.

In the meantime, we will ask the Government to fund interim upgraded safety measures along Kerferd Road, such as white line-marking, green treatments at conflict points and more signage, where appropriate. This will benefit all road users, including bike riders.

In a separate opportunity, our community can tell us what infrastructure they would like to feel safer when riding on our roads in the mid-strategy review of our Move, Connect, Live Integrated Transport Strategy which has opened for consultation.

I am pleased to share there has been a massive improvement to our City's kerbside bin collections since my last Divercity column.

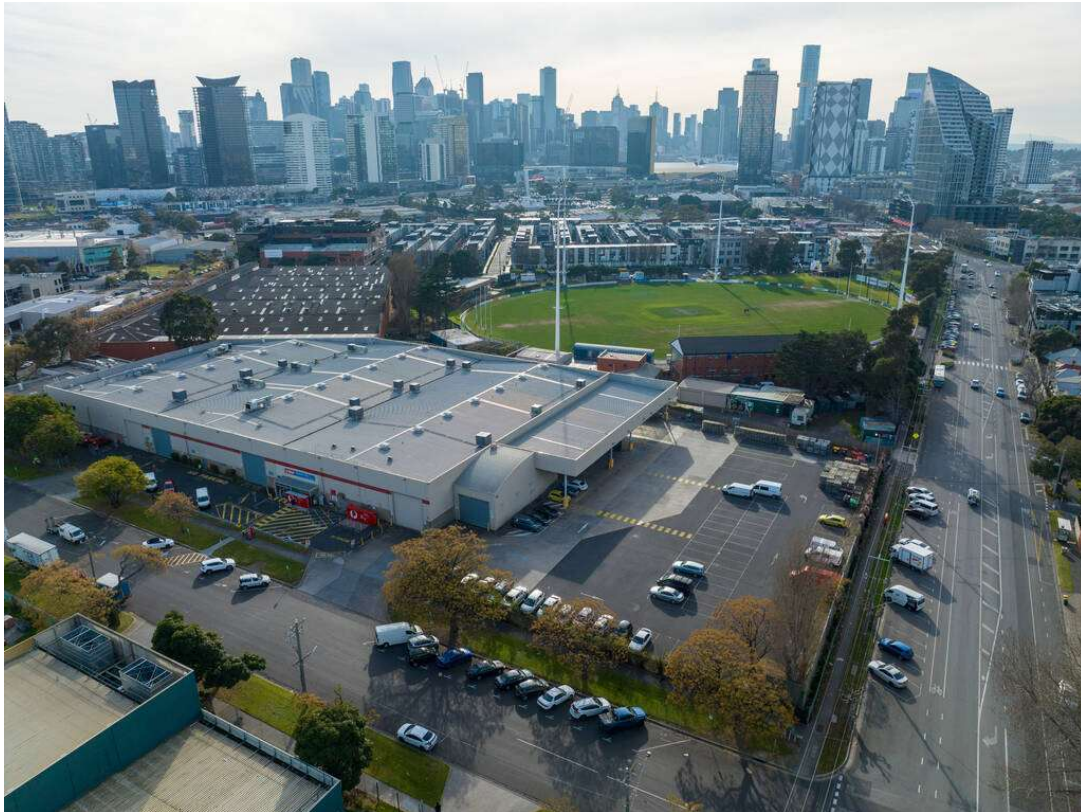
I assure you we will not rest until the service is working entirely as it should and a review will be undertaken to identify what went wrong and why after our new waste contractor Citywide took over.

I again sincerely thank those members of our community whose service was affected for their patience as we worked with Citywide to resolve this issue.

## Help us achieve a bright future for Fishermans Bend

Our Council is fighting for a bright future for Fishermans Bend – and we need your help.

Fishermans Bend is an exciting opportunity for our City and community but it risks being a lost opportunity. Every delay by the Victorian Government pushes back the chances of making this a world-class place to live, work and play.

The Fishermans Bend Framework 2018 makes a clear commitment to deliver significant open space, transport and infrastructure for the growing current and future community. This masterplan was the product of collaboration between Council, the Victorian Government, our community, developers and other stakeholders over a number of years.

Unfortunately, the promised open space (which ensures our area is liveable for residents and offers economic, social, health and environmental benefits for our municipality and our State) and infrastructure (such as Light Rail, Metro Rail and our Fishermans Bend community hospital) have not been delivered as agreed under the Framework and committed promises by the Government.

Our community must not be left without the services they need for a growing area.

An investment in open space is required now. Not a decade away. We have heard this loud and clear from our sporting clubs, residents, recreational users and dog walkers.

It has now been five years since the release of the Framework in 2018, without meaningful progress on several key projects. The framework commits to open space and community hub infrastructure by 2025, most of which has not been progressed even though we are already in 2023.

We are frustrated by the lack of progress as is our community. The Victorian Government has abandoned the plan for Fishermans Bend and it is time they now honour it.

Our Council has taken our role as a key partner seriously and done its best to ensure the Masterplan is delivered, yet our repeated requests for meetings, engagement and consultation with the State are not being heard and this raises grave concerns as to why.

These are just some of the acts and activities on offer in our biggest ever Seniors Festival. Croquet, community gardening, rowing, bowling, table tennis, online chair yoga, digital storytelling and art can all be enjoyed.

The Festival (1-15 October) also includes a safety forum, multicultural concert, healthy living seminars presented by the Alba and the Grace Retirement Community, a University of the Third Age Port Phillip's seminar and a multicultural dance, Beach Boys live music tribute, CaSPA Care annual concert and a joyful celebration of Jewish culture with amazing food, music, videos and dancing.

Writing is again strongly represented with workshops on crafting everything from memoirs to newsletters and the announcement of the 19th Port Phillip Writes awards.

Thanks to the Port Phillip Library Service, Dr Maggie Kirkman will talk about her compelling new book, *Time of Our Lives*, which challenges the stereotype of the 'helpless old woman' by celebrating the many contributions older women make to our community.

### Port Phillip a wayfinding winner

Our new St Kilda Arts Precinct signage was awarded gold at the 2023 Better Future Melbourne Design Awards under the Wayfinding category.

Standing at 2.4 metres tall, the four signs act as colourful beacons to increase awareness and foot traffic to the vibrant creative industries throughout St Kilda.



Created by [Arterial Design](#), the signs are located in an area identified as the St Kilda Arts Precinct and feature along the Bay Trail, Fitzroy Street, Acland Street and Carlisle Street.

The wayfinding signage builds on the look and feel of the St Kilda area by adding innovative and purposeful art to the streetscape. Visitors are encouraged to get out and explore St Kilda on foot as each sign labels the average walking time to reach local venues and institutions.

Each sign has its own distinct colour but forms a recognisable sculptural motif across the St Kilda precinct. The panel design is not only artistic, but functional with the consideration of simple and cost-effective panel replacement for venue name change.

The Melbourne Design Awards Wayfinding category celebrates creative and innovative design in the ways people orient themselves in physical space and navigate from place to place.

Consideration is given to signage and other graphic communication, clues in logical space planning, audible communication, tactile elements and provision for special-needs users.

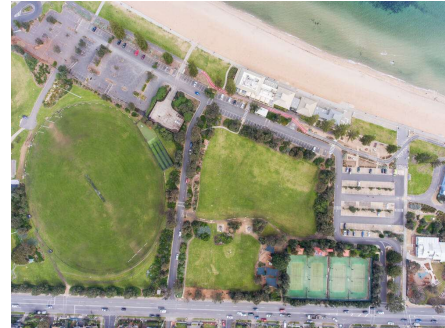

## Update on Elwood Foreshore

Elwood Foreshore is one of our City's premier places, attracting locals and visitors.

This important site, however, is facing a range of challenges, from fading amenity and increasing demand to ageing buildings and infrastructure and poor overall accessibility.



This is why our Council undertook community consultation on a proposed Site Plan to address the site's issues and opportunities progressively, without affecting the foreshore area's function, natural assets or unique character.

An adjusted draft Site Plan, informed by this consultation, is due to be considered at a September Council Meeting.

## The world's your oyster

What's On St Kilda and Southside celebrated World Oyster Day earlier this month by sharing some of the best spots to enjoy a wide variety of the mollusc delicacy in every Port Phillip suburb.

Given our beachy lifestyles, it's no surprise that we bayside dwellers love seafood, in particular an oyster or two.



Luckily for us, we have many special spots where you can shuck and suck back these creamy, salty shells of deliciousness year-round.

### **Bleakhouse Hotel**

Established in 1883, this gorgeous pub is a favourite amongst thirsty locals and bayside revellers alike. For the oyster lovers, every Friday they serve \$2.50 natural oysters and \$35 cocktail jugs if you need something refreshing to wash them down. With views over Port Phillip Bay, this is a stunning spot to get your oyster on.

### **Bistro Volière**

St Kilda's 'little piece of Paris' is serving up \$2 oysters and \$16 champagne every Friday and Saturday evening between 5 pm and 7 pm or, as the French would say, "Le Cinq à Sept". The informal expression refers to what could be considered a very French version of Happy Hour: the two hour period after work when people meet up with their lovers before going home to their spouses. Alternatively, champagne with oysters is another great option.

### **Post Office Club Hotel**

Speaking of Happy Hour, from Wednesday to Sunday, between 4 pm and 6 pm, the Post Office Club Hotel is slinging fresh shucked oysters for \$3.50! This iconic establishment has been looking after it's locals with welcoming service, great food and comfortable atmosphere since 1871. Add in oysters, \$8 beer and wines, plus cocktail specials and you have yourself the perfect evening.

### **Blue Tongue Wine Bar**

With a seafood range that is hand-selected daily and an exceptional wine list, this is the spot for fresh oysters and maybe a Chablis to match. Located right in the heart of Elwood Village, Blue Tongue Wine Bar provides only the freshest, locally-sourced, sustainable seafood, with an assortment of the best local wines and drops from famous regions around the globe.

### **Oyster Bar by Aptus Seafood**

The Oyster Bar by Aptus Seafood is the newest addition to the Aptus family. With a daily selection of sustainable oysters and an arrangement of delicious seafood options, this boisterous little stall is located in the West Aisle at South Melbourne Market.

### **Ripponlea Fish Supply**

Looking for something a little more low-key or like to shuck at home? Ripponlea First Supply is a family owned and run business serving up wild and responsibly sourced, sustainable seafood. And yes- they have oysters! Open 6 days a week, they also have a selection of fresh cooked food to take home too.

### **Recycle your shells!**

Since 2017, [South Melbourne Market](#) has partnered with [The Nature Conservancy](#) on a shell recycling project to aid in rebuilding the lost shellfish reefs of Port Phillip Bay. They collect oyster, scallop and mussel shells and use them to restore shellfish reefs across southern Australia. If you're near the market, drop your mollusc shells in the dedicated black bins.

## St Kilda's Alright!

The latest exhibition at the Carlisle Street Arts Space spotlights a selection of key works by artists who played a significant part in advancing St Kilda's creative culture during the 1980s, showcasing historical works from the Port Phillip City Collection.

St Kilda became a hub for experimental and independent artistic practice in the 1980s, with artists of all kinds – visual artists, fashion designers, musicians, writers and filmmakers – deciding to call it home.

The 1980s art scene helped to boost St Kilda's name as a local and international destination for first rate artists looking to push the boundaries of their discipline.

We're still pushing those boundaries today, as we celebrate the endorsement of the [St Kilda Live Music Precinct](#) – Victoria's first ever live music precinct.

To commemorate the endorsement of the precinct, we've curated the St Kilda's Alright! exhibition, which takes its name from Melbourne punk band I Spit on Your Gravy's 1985 album, St Kilda's Alright!, courtesy of the band's front man, artist and local legend, Fred Negro.

Council recognised the significance of the cultural shift experienced during the 1980s and established an Acquisition Fund to allow for key pieces to be purchased and safeguarded for future exhibitions.

There was a strong focus on collecting works from local and emerging artists, such as Howard Arkley, Stephen Bush, Tony Clark, John Nixon, Peter Walsh, and Jenny Watson.

A highlight of St Kilda's Alright! is three dresses created by Jenny Bannister, a renowned Australian fashion designer. Bannister's designs are intrinsically linked to the Melbourne punk movement and her

pieces often combined recycled materials with leather being a go-to staple. Fabric was distressed, studded, and perforated, creating a do-it-yourself, individual look.

St Kilda's Alright! is on display at the Carlisle Street Arts Space from 14 July to 22 September.

### We're making the big switch to energy efficient streetlights

Council is forecast to upgrade 1,578 of our streetlight bulbs to energy efficient LED alternatives over the next three months.



Between August and October 2023, Council is replacing 1,578 old streetlight bulbs to energy efficient Light-Emitting Diodes (LEDs) on major roads throughout the municipality, except for those overseen by VicRoads.

This streetlight upgrade was one of the key actions outlined on page 55 of our Act and Adapt:

Sustainable Environment Strategy 2018-28.

The new LED light bulbs have an estimated lifespan of seven years and meet relevant Australian Standards regarding safety and light levels.

We're expecting the new energy efficient LED lights to contribute to our City by:

- reducing our greenhouse gas emissions
- reducing our energy usage and costs
- reducing ongoing maintenance costs.

We're also expecting them to increase road and community safety through:

- greater uniformity of light level distribution on major roads
- better colour rendering and improved visibility
- greater consistency in light output over time
- reduced glare.

Because the streetlight infrastructure and power networks aren't property of Council, we are working closely with our two distribution network service providers – CitiPower and United Energy – to ensure a seamless switchover.

The streetlight replacement works will be completed by a qualified installer, Omexom Australia.

Changeover of the bulbs will require the use of an elevated platform and will be performed safely over parked cars. Traffic disruptions will be kept to minimal and shouldn't involve the need for parked cars to be moved. The crew will return to locations where large vehicles are obstructing works.

As part of the replacement requirement, any hazardous material found will be stored carefully and sent to a recycling centre for safe disposal. Where possible, elements of the old light bulbs will also be recycled into new products.

We're committed to providing a safer environment to the local community and contributing to a sustainable future for all.

We think the future of Port Phillip is looking brighter already!

## About's Story: From Royalty to Refuge

If you've had the pleasure of visiting Space2b Social Design in BalACLava, then chances are you would have been greeted by Retail Manager Aboutk Giir.

Aboutk found herself working at the arts and design social enterprise hub following a long journey which saw her family escaping religious persecution and civil war in South Sudan.



Aboutk is the granddaughter of a sub-tribal chief in South Sudan and many people with Sudanese heritage would immediately be aware of her lineage and status.

Her journey from royalty to refugee began in 2002 when her family fled South Sudan. Aboutk is one of around 24,000 South Sudanese people who left the country between 2001 and 2006 to escape the civil war.

Despite the challenges of integrating into a new society, Aboutk has emerged as a role model for her community through her work at Space2b. Her determination and resilience led her to become an artist and an architecture student all while raising her three young children.

"My parents wanted us to have a free life in Australia, and I think they achieved that," Aboutk said.

Aboutk's role as the Retail Manager is driven by her commitment to empowering others while fostering inclusion within her community.

"I have flourished since joining Space2b and I love how it allows you to just get out there and see the world and all it has to offer," she said.

"Space2b is a warm safe space where you are heard, loved and somehow, I feel confident and far less likely to want to hide as a human."

Located at 144 Chapel Street in BalACLava, Space2b is a social enterprise that supports new migrants, refugees, and individuals seeking asylum.

It provides a platform for creativity, culture, and entrepreneurship, empowering individuals to build economic independence and social connections.

Through workshops, training programs, and community engagement, Space2b creates opportunities for personal growth and social integration.
