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St Kilda Festival sneak peek

St Kilda Festival, Australia's most popular and iconic, free music festival, is returning for its 42nd year on 18 and 19 February.

Presented by our City, the Festival will take place across the St Kilda Foreshore and surrounds, with the Saturday showcasing a huge line-up of First Peoples' talent, followed by the traditional, Big Festival Sunday.

Headliners for Big Festival Sunday include Hoodoo Gurus and Confidence Man, with more than 50 additional acts to be announced on 18 January.

Saturday 18 February is the new First Peoples First day, featuring headliner Christine Anu. Saturday's line-up will also feature artists programmed by the Archie Roach Foundation including a tribute to the late Uncle Archie, who played St Kilda Festival 13 times, making him the artist who's performed at the Festival the most number of times.

Multiple stages will take over St Kilda for Big Festival Sunday, including the O'Donnell Gardens Stage with dedicated family programming, workshops and activations. The best of Australian live music will be showcased at the Main Stage on South Beach Reserve, as well as the Triangle Stage, Catani Gardens Stage, and the new Locals Stage at Acland Plaza. Roving performers and buskers will entertain throughout the precinct.

Meet our new CEO Chris Carroll

Chris Carroll is the City of Port Phillip's new Chief Executive Officer.

Mr Carroll was the Council's General Manager Customer, Operations and Infrastructure before acting as Interim CEO over the past few months.



"It's a privilege to be given the opportunity to lead the organisation responsible for looking after one of the best places in Australia," Mr Carroll said today.

"I thank the Councillors for their faith in me and I look forward to working closely with them and our amazing community and staff to make this an even greater place to live, work, visit, and do business."

Mayor Heather Cunsolo said the appointment followed a rigorous recruitment search which yielded extremely strong candidates from varying backgrounds.

"Our search was far and wide as Councillors wanted to ensure we chose a successful candidate with the best possible combination of experience and innovative ideas to help us lead our City in this key recovery phase of the COVID-19 pandemic."

During his stint as Interim CEO, Mr Carroll brought fresh ideas and a new approach to delivering the Council Plan, the roadmap for every decision impacting Port Phillip's diverse, growing community.

"His strategic business thinking, honed from the corporate world and local government leadership roles, will help us to deliver the many projects and services our community wants and deserves. Councillors have full confidence he is the right person for the job," Cr Cunsolo said.

Deputy Mayor Andrew Bond agreed Mr Carroll's knowledge and experience made him well-placed to help rebuild the City in the recovery phase.

"He has an intimate knowledge of Port Phillip – and our Council – and will use that experience to guide us over the next five years of his appointment," Cr Bond said.

Mr Carroll's leadership roles have provided him with extensive experience in organisational strategy and performance management, property and asset management, change leadership, and business transformation and improvement.

He joined the City of Port Phillip in March 2014. An outstanding leader with a breadth of local government, state government and private sector experience, he was a Director in PricewaterhouseCoopers New Zealand's consulting business.

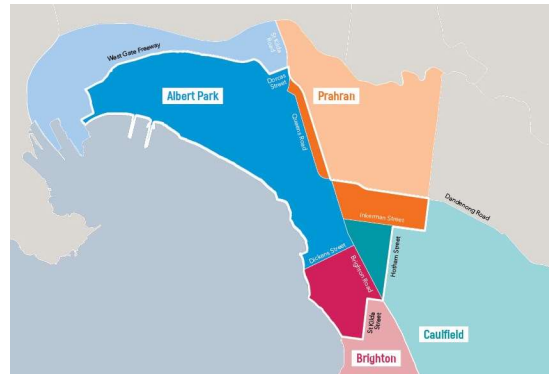
He also worked in a variety of leadership roles for Auckland Council and the former Auckland City Council and played a key role in the implementation of Auckland local government reforms.

Mr Carroll holds a Master of Public Policy and Management, a Master of Business Administration and is a member of the Australian Institute of Company Directors.

Advocacy Update

Our Council's advocacy efforts are continuing after the November Victorian Election which saw the Australian Labor Party's Nina Taylor elected as the new Member for Albert Park.

The Members for Caulfield (David Southwick, Liberal Party), Prahran (Sam Hibbins, Australian Greens) and Brighton (James Newbury, Liberal Party) retained their seats.



In the Legislative Council, the following candidates won or retained their Southern Metropolitan Region seats:

- David Davis (Liberal Party)
- John Berger (Australian Labor Party)
- Georgie Crozier (Liberal Party)
- Katherine Copsey (Australian Greens)
- Ryan Batchelor (Australian Labor Party).

(As Katherine Copsey had been a Port Phillip Councillor (Lake Ward), the Victorian Electoral Commission will run a countback on 16 January at 12 midday to fill the vacancy created by her election to the Victorian Parliament).

In the leadup to the Victorian Election, state advocacy priorities formed the basis of our advocacy campaign, which included letter writing, meetings, candidate tours and forums.

During the election campaign, Nina Taylor committed to the following local projects within the Albert Park electorate:

- A new primary school for Fishermans Bend
- \$1 million for upgrades to the Port Melbourne Bowls Club
- \$8.8 million for Stage 1 of the Masterplan for Middle Park Primary School
- \$1.5 million on safer crossings and works on Williamstown Road to make it safer to cross Williamstown Road to access Port Melbourne and JL Murphy Reserve
- \$250,000 to install a lift and upgrade the toilet block at the Port Melbourne Life Saving Club
- \$50,000 to assist the Albert Park Yachting & Angling Club, working in partnership with the Victorian Fisheries Authority for shellfish reef restoration
- Live Music Package, including introducing new planning laws that would provide heritage-style protections of specific live music venues (Live Music Precinct in St Kilda)
- A Community Battery for Port Phillip
- \$100,000 for Ready Set (South Melbourne) to help job seekers get into the workforce with clothing and coaching
- \$100,000 for Sacred Heart Mission to continue its work for the homeless and disadvantaged
- Working cooperatively with the City Of Port Phillip to put in place a school crossing supervisor at Port Melbourne Primary School.

We are working with her office to progress these commitments while continuing to advocate for our Council's state advocacy priorities.

The Labor Party committed to the following projects in the Caulfield, Prahran and Brighton electorates, which we will also advocate for during the Victorian Government's term:

- \$100,000 grant to support St Kilda Mums Inc's work of helping babies and families in need
- \$900,000 over three years to the Jewish Community Security Group (CSG).

We will also work with the re-elected Liberal and Greens MPs to advocate to the Victorian Government for commitments they made during the election which align with our state advocacy priorities. These include:

- upgrading community sporting facilities at Albert Park Reserve
- \$10 million to ANAM to restore and renew the South Melbourne Town Hall
- preliminary planning to Metro 2 (with stop at Fishermans Bend)
- \$100,000 to revitalise Carlisle Street, Balaclava
- \$2.5 million towards upgrading the Wattie Watson Pavilion
- Fast-tracking the construction of separated bike lanes on St Kilda Road.

Australia Day alcohol ban

New Year's was a success. Here's what you need to know about what comes next.

Although the summer weather may have arrived a little late, the recent heat has brought revellers to our beautiful foreshore.

The New Year's period was particularly busy with celebrations returning to an almost pre-COVID-19 level, once again proving why St Kilda is Victoria's most visited beach.



Thanks to the residents and visitors enjoying our public spaces, the celebrations were family-friendly and our City remained clean, safe and fun for everyone.

A huge multi-agency effort underpinned this success. We would like to thank our partners including Victoria Police, Liquor Licensing, Ambulance Victoria, Parks Victoria, Yarra Trams, VicRoads, Public Transport Victoria and Lifesaving Victoria.

Our Local Law Officers - and their distinctive beach buggy - were out and about supporting Victoria Police as they enforced the summer restrictions, including the city-wide New Year's alcohol ban.

With the Australia Day public holiday around the corner, it's important we also continue to play our part for a safe and successful summer.

The city-wide Australia Day alcohol ban will be in effect from 8 pm 25 January to 12 midday 27 January. During this time, unsealed containers of alcohol will not be permitted in any public areas. All other alcohol bans will continue to apply during this time too.

Anyone wanting to enjoy an alcoholic beverage can still do so at licensed venues or on private property.

FOGO recycling rolling out

We are rolling out kerbside food and garden organics (FOGO) recycling services this month.

From 9 January 2023 we will start delivering

FOGO bins to eligible stand-alone houses and townhouses. The new FOGO recycling service will begin the week commencing 23 January 2023.

How the service will work

We will provide eligible properties with a new 120L lime-green lidded FOGO bin. FOGO bins will be collected from kerbsides weekly on the same night as garbage and mixed recycling bin collection. In addition to garden waste (like lawn clippings, ivy, leaves and weeds) the new FOGO bin can be used to recycle all types of food waste, including fruit and vegetable scraps, meat, dairy products, and leftovers.



Why our Council is introducing this service

Our community has been asking us for FOGO recycling for some time. Our new FOGO service will allow Port Phillip residents to make a serious impact on the quantity of materials we are sending to landfill.

Food and organic waste makes up around 46 per cent of the waste our households send to landfill, and produces methane, a greenhouse gas that is approximately 21 times more potent than carbon dioxide. Not only will recycling FOGO materials reduce greenhouse gas emissions, collected FOGO materials are turned into compost and soil conditioner that can be used within Victorian parks and grounds. You will be using today's food and garden waste to grow tomorrow's fruits and vegetables!

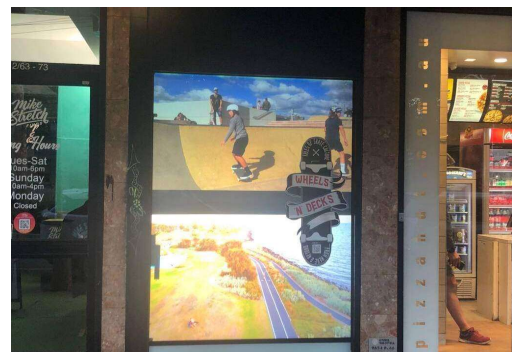

WHEELS 'n DECKS

Fitzroy Street, St Kilda, is the scene of a new projection installation celebrating three generations of skate culture.

WHEELS 'n DECKS is the third edition of the Aperture projection series created in collaboration with Renew Fitzroy Street.



City of Port Phillip's Film and Industry Lead Richard Sowada explains the history behind the exhibition:

Aperture seeks to harness histories and moments of St Kilda and the City of Port Phillip through surprising intersections, collaborations and connections.

The first instalment worked in conjunction with the Jewish Museum's Mirka Mora exhibition with two projectors at 43 Fitzroy Street. Our second instalment – Berlin by the Sea – highlighted St Kilda's punk rock history with a projection on a window at The George right at the entrance to the famed Crystal Ballroom, another again at 43 Fitzroy Street and one featuring the fantastic photographs of Peter Milne right next door at 39-41.

This time around, we're focusing on highlighting three generations of skate culture with some very nice and perhaps unknown links to St Kilda. The exhibition was born out of Globe Inc's

fabulous look at their own history and personal experiences in the book Unemployable.

With that as a starting point, Mish Eisen (Renew Fitzroy Street Project Manager) and I began a journey through skate parks looking at the people that inhabit them. On two projectors at good old 39-41 Fitzroy Street, you can see some of that Globe Inc history with around 30 images from the said book, plus the seminal Australian skate documentary Tic Tac 2 Heel Flip.

Take a short walk towards the Victorian Pride Centre and past a great little cluster of shops, and at 63 Fitzroy Street, you'll discover another three projections: a single channel work interviewing skate pioneer and Elwood resident Darren Winter, and right next to it, a two-channel projection looking at St Kilda skate park from above and a fun observational piece called Park Rats.

They've come up super well and as night falls, they really come into their own. If you're in the area, take a look.

Port Phillip Pride of Place for Midsumma Festival

The 2023 Midsumma Festival is back from 21 January to 12 February, with more than 200 events on offer in its biggest program yet.

We're proud that Port Phillip features prominently in the jam-packed arts and cultural program, from the Midsumma Pride March to the Victorian Pride Centre (VPC) providing a new festival hub.



Everyone is welcome to attend a rainbow flag raising ceremony hosted by our City on the front lawn of the St Kilda Town Hall at 4 pm on Tuesday 31 January. Rainbow pride flags will then fly at all our town halls until Sunday 6 February.

Our City is again sponsoring and participating in the Pride March on Sunday 5 February. Come and cheer the marchers as they move in a sea of colour down Fitzroy Street, St Kilda, to Catani Gardens. Enjoy the march and the best of everything that beautiful St Kilda has to offer on a summer Sunday, including fantastic dining and shopping. This year we're expecting a return to the bigger crowds of pre-2021, which saw 7,400 marchers being cheered on by 45,000 supporters from streets and balconies along the march route.

The Midsumma Carnival on Sunday, 22 January at Melbourne's Alexandra Gardens is another drawcard, with attractions including more than 180 stalls. Come along to our stall and chat with Councillors and staff from our employee Pride Network and dress up and get your photo taken at our free photo booth. The day will also feature an array of LGBTQIA+ acts set to grace three carnival stages and a dance party ending the annual extravaganza.

Port Phillip festival venues include a Midsumma celebration of live music, cabaret and spoken word poetry outdoors at Theatre Works, St Kilda, and performances at Gasworks Arts Park.

Forty-seven sessions of 26 different events will be taking place throughout the Victorian Pride Centre's Theatrette, Forum, gallery spaces and gorgeous rooftop in Fitzroy Street. The diverse program features a mix of free and ticketed events that showcase LGBTQIA+ artists and performers, foster social connection, facilitate important conversations and enable active participation in fun and interactive classes and workshops.

Port Phillip Council's longstanding support for Midsumma is a demonstration of our commitment to supporting the LGBTQIA+ community. Our Council Plan's strategic direction of an Inclusive Port Phillip visualises our City as "a place for all members of our community, where people feel supported and comfortable being themselves and expressing their identities".

Art From The Ground Up

It's A to Z as you've never seen before with Port Phillip Council commissioning a series of graffiti art murals with an alphabetical theme to deter illegal graffiti while, bringing colour to public spaces.

From the Ground Up saw 26 Melbourne street artists each create a mural across Port Phillip, representing a letter of their own name.



The brief was simple, let your imagination run wild, with the works often taking an abstract interpretation of the theme.

Project curator and lead artist, Ling, praised Council for positively promoting and celebrating graffiti art.

"The word graffiti generally has negative connotations. This project is extremely important as it focuses on the art form of graffiti," he said.

"Each mural is broken down into something as simple as the letter A or B, which makes it far more welcoming to someone who might look at graffiti and say they can't read it or don't understand it."

Ling's letter L mural is on a pillar of an onramp to the Westgate Freeway in Madden Street, Southbank.

"The space itself is one of those non-descript areas of the City that just kind of lives in the shadows and doesn't get any focus. Having the opportunity to use that space to create art has provided a point of difference in that area," Ling said.

From the Ground Up is part of Urban Canvas, a project funded by the Victorian Government's Community Support Fund, which aims to prevent graffiti vandalism through the installation of unique street art.

The selected locations are high profile sites, mostly featured on third-party assets and were identified by Council's Graffiti Management Team as illegal graffiti hotspots.

Usually, Council can't remove graffiti or touch assets owned by the Victorian Government and third parties, such as utilities suppliers and transport providers.

Under the Urban Canvas project, however, government agencies and companies including Yarra Trams, Telstra, VicRoads, Australia Post, Citipower, South East Water and VicTrack have given permission for Council to remove graffiti and commission art for their assets.

Port Phillip Council Acting Mayor Andrew Bond said Council completed 2,413 graffiti removal requests in the 2021-2022 financial year, which included the removal of 14,970 square metres of illegal graffiti across the City.

"Illegal graffiti is an unsightly issue for Council and our community. We're taking a creative approach to tackling illegal graffiti which supports artists to bring colour and life to many

locations across our City.” he said.

The murals will be highlighted as part of an exhibition on graffiti culture at the Carlisle Street Arts Space at St Kilda Town Hall. The exhibition is open until March.

Gospel Sundays at Linden

Linden New Art will channel St Kilda’s music and community history by turning the Linden yard into a summer pop-up whiskey bar.

Gospel Sundays will feature live music from a range of Port Phillip artists selected from our Council’s Live N Local Featured Artist Database.

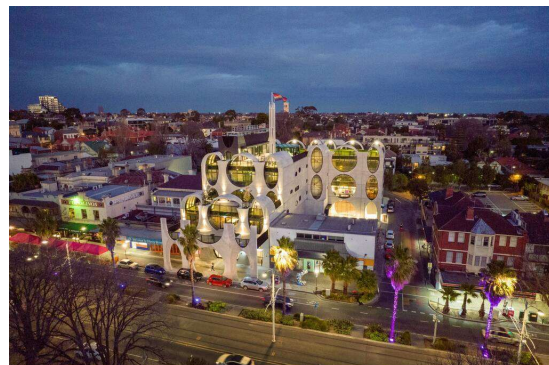

Scrap metal transformed into imaginative art

Port Melbourne is now home to Australia’s largest metal art gallery with the opening of a new attraction that blends art and play.

The recently launched Making of the Victorian Pride Centre is a compelling exploration of the history of Victoria’s LGBTIQ+ communities, including the conception, design, construction and opening of Australia’s first purpose-built Pride Centre on Fitzroy Street.

Thoughtfully composed and lavishly illustrated, the

impressive display of over 200 metal sculptures ranging from metal tankard mugs to larger than life dinosaurs and superhero sculptures.

Gallery Manager Ciel Dong said that all the sculptures are handmade from scrap metal and recycled materials.

"The metal artworks are made using anything from nails to car engines to form beautiful sustainable artworks."

Ms Dong described Met Art World as an interactive art playground for all ages.

"We're not your usual art gallery where children are not allowed to play, run, touch and hold," she said.

"At Met Art World we really encourage people to explore the sculptures and enjoy the works."

Met Art World's sculptures can be purchased directly from the gallery.

"If someone has the space to take our giant four-metre Transformer sculpture back to their home garden, they can do just that," Ms Dong joked.

The gallery's second floor displays its fantasy starry sky exhibition in a combination of technology and a world of lights, mirrors and shadows.

Visitors can explore 12 different themed rooms including the candy maze, enchanted forest, 360° tunnel, jellyfish maze and many more when this exhibition reopens after renovations.

book was commissioned by independent fundraising organisation The Pride Fund.

Jude Munro AO, the Inaugural Chair of the Victorian Pride Centre and a current Board Director of The Pride Fund, said the book authored by Dr Judith Buckrich, was an important opportunity to recognise and thank those involved in the centre's journey so far.

"The book celebrates the work of over 150 people to fund, achieve a site, design, build, and tenant the building; an iconic, award-winning centre to bring our LGBTIQ+ community together and which provides a safe and welcoming home for us all."

"The fight for our rights continues. Young LGBTIQ+ people make up one third of all homeless youth. A half of trans people have attempted suicide in their lifetime. The Pride Centre brings together support services, and a place to celebrate our victories and remember our sometimes painful past," she said.

Dr Buckrich echoes Jude Munro's sentiments. "This book is devoted to the extraordinary people who broke through so many seemingly impossible barriers to create what is one of our finest and most welcoming public buildings, a place where people and organisations can feel positive about their history, and achievements. And, of course, the tasks that lie ahead."

A sustainable New Year's resolution

Still looking for a New Year's resolution that benefits you and your community? Then sign up to our Environmental Leaders course to start contributing to a more sustainable future.

Starting in March, this free 10-week course supports you to develop and lead your own sustainability action project and will focus on individual growth in a team-based environment.

The course is aimed at anyone who wants to become an environmental leader with no pre-requisites or skills required.

It doesn't matter if you are a seasoned environmental project manager or someone at the beginning of your environmental journey. It's your ideas, enthusiasm and openness that are required.



Environmental leaders from the August 2021 course founded the Waste No More recycling and reusing app, the Make It Happen repair café, as well as Melbourne Makers – an online platform connecting residents with local businesses and many more great initiatives.

One participant, Karen, used her skills and knowledge to launch the Elwood Kitchen Library after completing the course.

The Elwood Kitchen Library is a non-profit, volunteer run, lending library of small-medium size kitchen appliances, cookware, bakeware, cookbooks and zero waste party and entertaining packs. Elwood Kitchen Library provides its members with access to hundreds of items in its inventory, helping them to entertain family and friends, fulfil their culinary dreams and live more sustainably.

Other participants who completed the course last year gave the following feedback about the program:

- "The course went far and beyond my expectations in regard to the contents and delivery of the units and the guidance by our facilitator."
- "It has enhanced my existing skills and taught me some new ones. I loved connecting with other like-minded people in my community. It is a great way to stay inspired and to think about new projects."
- "This training has been truly transformational on many levels. It's taken me to a point where I feel empowered to take action on issues of environmental sustainability."

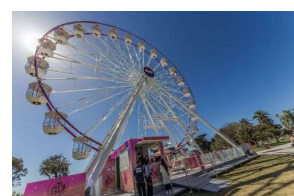
