The five nursing trainees will study at the University of Lorosae for 4 years in general nursing and midwifery. The FoS/C education group is especially pleased as we are aware of the hurdles jumped by the girls to gain entry into nursing.

Another first in 2016 is four Covalima year 10 students, two girls and two boys gaining entry to Don Bosco Technical School in Maliana. It's a government funded school managed by the church, with a great curriculum and offers opportunities for technical and academic skills, not too far from home.

Friends of Suai is fundraising to ensure all students are provided with the opportunity to complete their study.

Last year in 2015, Elsa Barreto graduated in primary teaching (3 year diploma) at the Baucau Teachers' College. Elsa has secured temporary employment teaching in 2016. Two further students at the college, Simao Noronha and Honorio Gusmao completed their second year with high distinctions. Seven students completed trades and administration courses in Covalima. Big congratulations to all the students. Also congratulations to the education staff at the Covalima Community Centre (CCC) who work hard to assist the students to make it all possible.

Approximately fifty students over three years have now been trained under Friends of Suai scholarship program. According to CCC records, 50% of the students are now in employment. This is a great outcome as employment figures in Timor Leste are very low.

Our English teacher volunteers from Australia found that many Timorese teachers had difficulty using the English text books currently taught in years 7- 12. Over the last 12 months the volunteers developed detailed teachers notes for all of the 6 text books currently in use. The notes contain answers to the more difficult questions, vocabulary definitions and other useful background information about the modules especially when an Internet reference point is included in the text. WASH

The Centro Comumidade Covalima (CCC) during 2015 year has overseen the management and construction of the Suai Secondary School WASH project supported by Rotary International and Friends of Suai/Covalima in Australia. The project received pro bono advice on the WASH construction from experienced water engineers at BESIK, in Dili. This has ensured quality control and technical advice across the operation. There are still a few jobs outstanding but the project is well on the way to completion.

A problem with stable electricity is proving a problem at the school but the school committee and CCC are lobbying the national authority to assist to rectify the problem.

The WASH project will ensure that 2000 students are provided with water and sanitation at the school which has not had water for 15 years. The WASH project provides eighteen toilets. The project design

incorporates water supply, septic tank and construction of a new 15,000 litre tank.

Students and parents have developed an Operation and Maintenance Plan. Health and hygiene education includes hand washing, the hazards of cigarette smoking, prevention of malaria and dengue fever, reproductive health, menstruation hygiene, HIV/AIDS and Child rights. One of the aims of the WASH project is to encourage girls to remain at school to further their education and life prospects. Many girls do not finish secondary school in Timor Leste.

This project will make a big difference to people's health and well-being in Covalima. •

Timor Gap seminars

Two recent seminars on Maritime Boundaries

in the Timor Sea: Perspectives in International Law and Crocodiles in the Timor Sea hosted by Monash and Swinburne Universities were well attended and informative. The seminars provided valuable information about the legal and technical issues related to the maritime sea boundary with Timor-Leste by examining the ongoing dispute through the eyes of experts in international law and maritime boundary delimitation.

The Maritime Boundaries in the Timor Sea seminar brought together leading academic experts from Australia and Indonesia to examine the dispute and inform potential solutions on maritime boundaries. Following this, a planned discussion between Timor-Leste's Ambassador to Australia, Hon Abel Guterres, and a representative from Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) was not held due to DFATs withdrawal from the program. The Ambassador stressed the friendship between the two countries as an underlying principle of ongoing negotiations, but Timor-Leste's strong belief that defining a maritime boundary is essential for the country's economic future.

At Crocodiles in the Timor Sea Dr Sara Niner contextualised the discussion about Australia's relationship with Timor-Leste using information from the national archives of 30 years ago. Dr Brett Inder made economics understandable with his discussion about the impacts on poverty of the lost oil revenues due to the lack of seabed sovereignty, and former First Lady, Kirsty Sword-Gusmao provided a human perspective, graphically describing the poor health and poverty status of the Timorese population. Clear from these discussions was Australia's power and wealth sits in stark contrast to the poverty of Timor-Leste and the economic resources of Timor Sea are of much greater significance to Timor than they are to Australia.

It's busy at the CCC. The centre has just received news it will be accredited as a registered training organisation in the national certificate in Administration in IT. Community training in IT and English language at the centre has provided community since 2005. The centre is now providing training to government departments in the district

The Rural Women's Development Project funded by International Womens' Development Agency based at the CCC has completed a very positive evaluation recognising the achievements of the project supporting over 100 women in leadership and economic development in Covalima. A number of the women have been elected to committee to represent their communities both in the village and district.

The CCC has also explored new partnerships with the Asia foundation (TAF) and Oxfam as well as other organisations. Staff had recently completed research on community policing for TAF which had extended staff skills and used digital technology to complete the research on computer tablets with centralised data system.
