From the Chamber

Some of you reading this may have been experiencing missed bin collections since Citywide became our new kerbside bin contractor on 3 July.

I want to personally thank you for your patience and understanding as Citywide resolves its route and bin location mapping issues. There have been big improvements and Citywide is expecting to achieve significantly more collections this week.



While most waste collection services are unaffected, this is little consolation to those understandably frustrated by the delays.

We are doing everything we can to assist Citywide rectify its mapping issues and I know our staff redeployed in Council trucks to help reduce the backlog are appreciating the kind words from residents when they roll up to lend a hand.

The official launch of the Waterlines sculpture at Kirrip Park is a timely reminder of why we are committed to doing what we can to achieve a sustainable and liveable Port Phillip.

This includes endorsing three key sustainability plans and strategies in July to go out for community consultation. They are the:

draft Climate Emergency Plan

- draft Act and Adapt Sustainable Environment Strategy 2023-28
- Urban Forest Strategy Draft Vision and Principles.

The draft Climate Emergency Plan focuses on five key priorities, including minimising greenhouse gas emissions, more sustainable transport options and enhancing our community's resilience.

Our draft Act and Adapt Strategy involves building on, expanding and reviewing the earlier 2018 version to ensure we have the most effective actions and targets to tackling everything from carbon emissions to waste reduction.

We know urban forestry and greening is incredibly important to our community. Our updated strategy will deliver a long-term framework to guide the planning, provision and protection of greenery across our beautiful City.

All these initiatives are on our Have Your say webpage. I encourage everyone to provide their feedback to guide us as we tackle important environmental issues now – and into the future.

There was a "full house" in the public gallery at a Council Meeting when we discussed whether to proceed with building a public toilet in Fitzroy Street. There were strong views expressed both for and against before the decision was ultimately made not to proceed.

Efforts to find a location had been underway for 16 years as there is general agreement that a public toilet is needed – only the site is debated. While an alternate potential location won't be explored until at least 2025, it would be wonderful if a future development on Fitzroy Street could include public toilet facilities.

A petition to stop plans to redevelop Lagoon Reserve also drew some passionate community members to the Chamber in July. While we are continuing with our plans for the \$15 million redevelopment, which includes greatly improved grounds and a two storey sporting pavilion, we acknowledge the dog walking community who loves this space and will make sure they continue to have access after the works are done.

As our City is home to a large rainbow community, I was delighted to see our LGBTIQA+ Action Plan adopted in the Chamber.

This Plan sets out outcomes we want to reach, based on the needs and aspirations of LGBTIQA+ people, and how to achieve them.

We really appreciated the excellent feedback received during the consultation phase, including from our LGBTIQA+ Advisory Committee. The next step is developing an implementation plan to bring us closer to attaining our vision of "an inclusive City where diverse LGBTIQA+ communities are safe, connected and celebrated".

Waterlines a wonder for Port Phillip City Collection

A thought-provoking public art addition to the Port Phillip City Collection was officially launched in July.

Located in Kirrip Park, Waterlines is a large glass-fibre reinforced concrete sculpture created by renowned Australian artist lan Strange and funded and donated to our City by Wonderment Walk Victoria.

The artwork is valued at \$300,000 and resembles a local roof peak reflecting the residential and industrial heritage of the Montague area.

Waterlines explores the long and complex history of flooding and water management that has shaped the Fishermans Bend precinct and sparks an important conversation on the threat of a rising water table.

Strange, a multi-disciplinary artist, explained the bottom portion of the sculpture is marked in black to depict exactly where water levels reached in a historical 'one-in-100-year' flooding event.

"One of my favourite things from the research was finding the photos of the floods and seeing kids floating down the street on doors and playing in the floods," Strange said.

"It was always really polluted and covered in this sort of black coal. And then during these floods the waterlines would rise up and leave these black markings on houses and buildings." "The sculpture itself is based on a series of cuts taken out of timber-framed homes and so really replicates a lot of the tropes of those early workers' homes in the area," Strange said.

Strange collaborated with science educators to produce a free primary education resource for

South Melbourne Primary School, which sits adjacent to Kirrip Park. The resource encourages students to think and respond to the artwork through multiple lenses including visual art, science, humanities, and mathematics.

The sculpture was installed in April 2020, shortly after the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. The artwork was celebrated with an official launch event in July to acknowledge its donation to the Port Phillip City Collection.

Wonderment Walk Victoria is a philanthropic initiative which develops and installs public art across Melbourne with a scientific and environmental focus. For more information about Waterlines, visit the Wonderment Walk Victoria website.

Kerbside bin collections update

We're pleased to share we are receiving fewer reported missed bin collections and our new waste contractor is expecting significant improvements to their kerbside service this week.



There have been unacceptable numbers of missed rubbish, recycling and FOGO bin collections since Citywide took over as our contractor on 3 July.

While the vast majority of these services have been going smoothly, we acknowledge this is little consolation to those residents who have been affected and we understand their frustration.

Since last week, the number of missed bins reports has dropped drastically. While this is encouraging, further improvement is imperative and our Council will continue to do everything we can to help Citywide resolve its route and bin location mapping issues.

This includes Council staff undertaking street audits to inform Citywide of any missed collections. We are also checking their maps to make sure they are listing all streets and laneways.

You may have also noticed redeployed Council staff out and about in our trucks every day to help reduce the number of unemptied bins.

Residents have the option of dropping off their rubbish free of charge at our Resource Recovery Centre until kerbside services are operating normally.

If you are still experiencing missed bins, please let us know via the Snap, Send, Solve app or My Port Phillip on our website. This means we can continue to:

- let Citywide know where they have missed bins
- capture critical data to send to Citywide to improve the accuracy of their maps
- · send Council crews to help empty missed bins.

We have also reinforced to Citywide that bins must be returned neatly to where they were picked up.

We sincerely thank everyone for their patience and will continue to keep our community informed as full restoration of affected collection services moves closer.

Flashing lights saving drivers from flash flooding

Newly installed flood monitoring equipment is enhancing the safety of two flood-prone roads in Elwood.

The flood monitoring device on Foam and Wave streets features flashing lights which activate automatically to warn drivers about oncoming floodwater across the road.



If the floodwater continues to rise to a higher trigger level, Council officers are alerted via text message and close the road.

The lights have been triggered multiple times since being installed after high tides and rainfall on Wave Street.

Council officers have seen drivers stopping and turning around when the lights are activated rather than attempting to drive through the submerged road.

The devices are also allowing Council staff to respond even faster to flash flooding events.

Always remember to never drive through floodwater. It can take just 15cm of flowing water to float a car.

Help shape our City's electoral structure

An advisory panel is conducting a review of the electoral structure in Port Phillip. The panel is seeking your feedback to ensure all voters are represented in a fair and equitable way.



The advisory panel is supported by the Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC). The panel will consider:

- the appropriate number of councillors and wards for the council
- ward boundary locations
- · ward names.

Public information sessions about the review will be held at 12 pm on Monday 17 July and 6 pm on Tuesday 18 July. Visit the VEC website and click the link to attend the live online event.

The panel will consider the requirements of the law to propose models for the council's structure. This will be outlined in a preliminary report. You will be able to share your views on this report and which model would best serve your community. This is known as a response submission.

The preliminary report is released and response submissions will close at 5 pm on Wednesday

9 August.

At the end of the review, the panel will make a final recommendation to the Minister for Local Government. Any change to the electoral structure for the City following this review is expected to apply at the next Council elections.


Community grants applications are open

The City of Port Phillip welcomed the Minister for Police and Minister for Crime Prevention, Anthony Carbines, to St Kilda Town Hall this month for a discussion on crime prevention and the opportunity for collaboration with the Victorian Government in the interests of safety for our residents and traders.



Mayor Heather Cunsolo and CEO Chris Carroll sat down with the Minister to discuss efforts by our Council to address disadvantage within our City, and our ongoing efforts to support residents who are experiencing financial difficulties.

Our Council budget extended the Launch Housing funding agreement for two more years, providing \$110,000 per year for outreach services to assist people sleeping rough and allocated \$40,000 for increased food relief in Port Phillip.

Crime prevention and deterrence across our municipality remain a priority for Councillors.

Mayor Cunsolo said the meeting was an opportunity to get our message across that more must be done to ensure our residents and traders feel safe, and that our streets are welcoming and thriving for visitors from across Victoria and beyond.

"This was an important opportunity for us to ensure the messages we are hearing from some members of our community about safety in our City were heard directly by the Minister," Cr Cunsolo said.

"We are looking forward to hearing more about how our Council and the Victorian Government can work together to deliver great outcomes for our City."

This followed other Mayoral discussions held recently with Josh Burns, the Member for Macnamara and Nina Taylor, the Member for Albert Park.

The City of Port Phillip continues to use every opportunity to pursue a rigorous advocacy agenda for 2023/24 across a wide range of project and policy aims.

Scooting safely in Port Phillip

The Victorian Government has expanded its e-scooter trial under strict new rules.

Safely using and parking e-scooters is important for everyone so we encourage riders to visit the Department of Transport and Planning's (DTP) website for safety tips.

We are also continuing to work with DTP and operators to address community concerns around safety and amenity, including poor parking on footpaths.



E-scooters are being well-utilised with over 740,000 trips completed in Port Phillip since the trial began in February 2022.

A mural project in the St Kilda Botanical Gardens has transformed the temporary hoarding around the Port Phillip EcoCentre redevelopment site.

Artist, Emily Gardner from ADORE Murals and Artwork, created the mural to reflect the beauty of the surrounding gardens by promoting the local biodiversity

The mural design was created in consultation with volunteers from the Port Phillip EcoCentre, the Friends of St Kilda Botanical Gardens, and visitors to the Gardens. The design features birds and animals who visit the Gardens as well as its indigenous plants. Paint used for the mural is carbon-absorbing, in keeping with the environmentally sustainable design of the new EcoCentre building.

The artist set out to portray a natural environment to connect to the surroundings.

"Through collaborative design and carbonabsorbing paint, we transformed the construction site into a sustainable, living canvas and a meaningful connection to our unique natural heritage, inviting viewers to cherish and protect our environment," she said.

This project was funded under Council's Public Art program, separate to the redevelopment project. The hoarding and mural will be recycled to another building site once the redevelopment is completed.

The mural helps to enrich the space by connecting locals and visitors to their environment and adding a sense of meaning and place. By beautifying this key area, we can make it feel safer and more connected through a shared appreciation of what makes our Garden unique.

We expect construction work on the EcoCentre Redevelopment to be completed in mid-2024. The mural will remain while the hoarding is in place.



Fifty year milestone of fighting for justice

A free St Kilda community legal service has celebrated 50 years of helping thousands of people on low incomes find justice.

As a community legal centre, Southside Justice supports people experiencing violence and abuse, financial hardship, housing insecurity and discrimination and other social and legal issues.



Southside Justice began as the St Kilda Free Legal Service in 1973, a time when passionate lawyers and volunteers started banding together to make legal advice more accessible and available.

"Our Centre had its beginnings in this social movement and we are very proud to be providing free legal advice half a century later," Southside Justice CEO Mel Dye said.

Southside Justice's work includes Community Justice Partnerships with the Better Health Network, Launch Housing, Sacred Heart Mission and the Salvation Army.

"These partnerships recognise that a lawyer is not always the first person our clients will turn to for legal help. By delivering targeted, timely and integrated legal help at the right time, we can help resolve problems which might otherwise escalate, causing even more issues, disadvantage and higher costs."

Mel estimates the centre has assisted tens of thousands of people over the past 50 years and remains an important community resource for those requiring legal help.

"This is an incredible milestone and also a stark reality that there are still many people in our community going through tough times," she said.

"In the last financial year we assisted close to 900 people. Given the complex and interconnected issues people face, the demand for our service is increasing."
