The plan, which includes the 2025/26 budget, has already been informed by feedback from almost 1300 people, including a 40-member community panel.

This feedback has shaped a theme of community safety, connection and cohesion, reflected in a broad range of proposed services and projects.

As the 3 May federal election nears, we are continuing to campaign for our community by ensuring all Macnamara candidates are aware of our advocacy asks for our community.

There's another voting opportunity in this issue. We have three projects nominated for local government awards - and voting closes soon. This is a great opportunity to nationally showcase these great initiatives so please take a look.

Help us Plan for Port Phillip

Community consultation is underway for our Council's draft Plan for Phillip 2025-35, including the proposed 2025/26 budget.

The four-year plan, with a 10-year horizon, will be updated annually to ensure it is meeting the needs of Port Phillip's diverse community.

"This is the first over-arching plan – and budget - to be delivered over the four-year term of our Council and we are keen to hear from our community on whether you think we have hit the mark," our Mayor Louise Crawford said.

Cr Crawford said the draft already reflects direct feedback from almost 1300 people, including a 40-member community panel.

"This proposed plan - with its focus on community safety, connection and cohesion - is key to achieving the updated vision. I urge everyone to take a deep dive into the plan and tell us what you think."

Themes woven into to the draft plan reflecting preliminary community input include:

Community safety

The draft Budget includes an additional \$250,000 to fund new actions flowing from the recent Community Safety Roundtable and the updated Community Safety Plan under

development.

Community connection and cohesion

Additional \$250,000 to fund activities addressing loneliness and isolation, social connection and combating discrimination and racism and anti-Semitism, including \$60,000 to fast track the delivery of the Multicultural Strategy. There's also a \$1.2 million allocation for affordable housing to be provided over two years, pending the development of the updated housing and homelessness strategy.

Improved amenity

Additional \$200,000 to uplift city amenity, including increased street cleaning and pressure washing of main streets across Port Phillip, and an extra \$9 million over the next decade towards improving roads and local infrastructure.

Events and festivals

Consolidation of the St Kilda Festival to enable an additional \$450,000 to be invested in arts and community strengthening initiatives. The specifics of these will be agreed by Councillors after the budget process but may include increased grant opportunities and greater prioritisation on events and activations across the municipality.

Greener City, including access to open space

Additional \$400,000 to improve greening throughout the City, including the development of urban forest precinct plans, and an extra \$4.5 million for the demolition and remediation of the newly acquired Sandridge public open space.

These are just some of the projects and initiatives encompassed in the comprehensive draft plan which provides a roadmap on serving the Port Phillip community right now – and for years to come.

Feedback closes on 18 May 2025. Council will then review all submissions and prepare a report summarising the community's input. A final plan will be adopted in June.



Ripponlea reimaged

Ripponlea is rebuilding in the wake of the horrific terror attack on the Adass Israel Synagogue in December.

While the trauma will never be forgotten, recovery efforts are gaining momentum with Ripponlea especially vibrant and busy during Passover and Easter.

The Adass Israel community has deeply appreciated the support from the Ripponlea community, both in the immediate aftermath of the attack and during the current recovery phase.

“It has felt like a nice warm hug,” Adass Israel congregation board member Benjamin Klein said. “The community has stood by us, including sending donations and letters and cards of support.”

He also praised emergency services, including Victoria Police, and City of Port Phillip for their help.

There are now several temporary sites for daily prayers and community gatherings, which also successfully housed Passover celebrations. They will remain during the estimated two to three year build for a new Synagogue and community centre.

The Shul is working with international and local architects and town planners to present concept drawings to the community and Council, which is advising on the permit process.

“The plans will take time and we look forward to sharing them with the community in the future,” Mr Klein said.

The Shul has undertaken fund-raising for the rebuild and the Australian Government and federal Opposition both pledged funding during the election campaign so the Synagogue continues to serve as a safe and welcoming place for worship and community activities.

In a further act of support, the Port Phillip Multifaith Network, with Cr Libby Buckingham, recently visited to meet faith leaders and encourage interfaith connections.

Meanwhile, our Council is looking at how to improve and expand the public areas surrounding the Shul for everyone to enjoy under a precinct plan.

Our draft 2025/26 Budget proposes allocating \$60,000 to investigate from July:

- public realm improvements integrating security interventions, such as bollards and barriers, which provide hostile vehicle mitigation while maintaining an open and welcome public space
- more street trees and greening
- lighting upgrades
- improved connections with the Ripponlea train station and nearby Burnett Grey Gardens
- improved links to the Shul from the Glen Eira Road retail precinct.

There will be opportunities for our Ripponlea community, including traders, to have their say on the revitalisation.

The draft Budget also includes an additional \$250,000 to fund activities addressing loneliness and isolation, social connection and combating discrimination and racism and anti-Semitism, including \$60,000 to fast track the delivery of the Multicultural Strategy.

Our Ripponlea traders continue to offer exceptional retail and hospitality offerings in this historic and culturally significant part of Port Phillip. Opportunities to reinvigorate the Glen Eira Road shopping precinct will be considered under Council’s Great Places and

Precincts program in collaboration with existing initiatives such as differential rates being implemented to discourage commercial vacancies.

Please show them your support as we rebuild Ripponlea together.

Campaigning for our community

As the 3 May federal election approaches, our Council has been actively campaigning to ensure our advocacy asks for our community are front and centre with Macnamara candidates.



We have engaged with all six candidates through meetings and letters and shared a Priority Project Opportunities document for them to consider.

Our Council's election tracker is regularly updated to reflect commitments made within the City of Port Phillip relating to our assets or advocacy priorities. Notable pledges aligning with Council priorities include:

- Over \$30 million to rebuild the Adass Israel Synagogue (Liberal, Labor)
- \$1.4 million for council investment in North Port Oval (Liberal)
- \$400,000 to support the EcoCentre fit-out (Greens, Labor)
- Funding for CCTV: \$520,000 (Liberal) and \$1.5 million (Labor)
- \$12.5 million for the Australian National Academy of Music at South Melbourne Town Hall (Labor).

Scooting safely

Since 2022, there have been 1.5 million shared e-scooter scheme rides getting residents and visitors around our City.

We have listened to our community's safety and amenity concerns and are continuing to improve how this convenient and low-emission travel option is ridden and parked.

Improvements our Council has implemented over the past six months - or successfully encouraged operators to undertake - include:

- 50 eye-catching "no footpath riding" decals at key high streets and activity centres to educate riders about the road rules and deter them from riding on footpaths
- the almost complete rollout of footpath detection cameras across the entire scooter fleet in Port Phillip. These cameras can be used to issue verbal alerts, and if necessary, disciplinary action on users by the operators
- continuing to require 'no parking' digital geofences in apps so GPS technology stops



users from ending their trips in unsuitable locations

- an upcoming trial of 10 marked on-footpath parking bays at key high streets and activity centres with wide footpaths to further improve e-scooter parking in these areas. A consultation will be part of this trial.

Our Council will be considering its long-term position on e-scooters in the next few months.

Making history

Port Phillip locals were presented with major prizes recently at the 2024 Victorian Community History Awards ceremony.

Albert Park's Phillip Derry (pictured) won the History Article Award for his piece "A Community in Crisis: Dr Deery and the Healesville Hospital Dispute, 1961–62".

The judges said: "Phillip Deery is arguably Australia's foremost historian of the cold war years. He has a knack for using biography to elucidate the bigger sweep of history, based on deep research into often arcane archives that he deploys with a light but masterful touch."
