From the Chamber

Many of you will have already seen that we are asking our community to help us shape the St Kilda Triangle.

At our September Council Meeting, we decided to forge ahead with community consultation on a proposed stand-up 5000 capacity indoor live music venue to help activate this under-utilised location.

We believe a venue of this size and flexible design would be a fantastic way of activating this site, previously home to former entertainment drawcards including the Palais de Danse dance hall and Palace Nightclub.



Music industry experts told us during the feasibility study that this concept would help fill a gap in the market.

Now we are eager to hear what our community thinks. Please have your say - online, at pop-up events or drop-in sessions – before this extensive community consultation closes at midnight on 19 October. Your feedback is crucial and will inform a report on potential next steps.

In another significant opportunity for our community, we adopted the Elwood Foreshore Site Plan at September's Council Meeting to renew this popular and much-loved part of Port Phillip.

The site plan will provide guidance over the next decade as we replace aged infrastructure, improve access to this beautiful open space and address climate change risks.

Extensive community engagement resulted in some changes to the draft Plan and we will continue to seek our community's views as we progressively roll-out much-needed improvements.

At the same meeting we adopted our Public Toilet Plan 2023-33. This updated Plan includes more focus on consultation for public toilet projects and detailed information about sites identified for feasibility and investigation studies.

We also endorsed progressing the proposed design for the Elder Smith Netball Courts and Pavilion in Port Melbourne, including providing an extra \$1.7 million for courts and a pavilion.

This is yet another example of our long-standing commitment to helping provide much-need open space for our growing community, especially in Fishermans Bend and nearby northern suburbs. Elder Smith was chosen as the site for the new netball courts as it will connect with the future Prohasky Reserve sporting precinct, part of the Fishermans Bend urban renewal.

In my previous column, I shared our deep concern about the Victorian Government abandoning its delivery plan for Fishermans Bend, from open space to public transport.

I'd like to thank everyone who has contacted me on this issue. By going to our page, <u>A bright future for Fishermans Bend - City of Port Phillip</u>, you can learn more including how you can support our call for Fishermans Bend to live up to its tremendous promise.

I know kerbside waste collection is still on the radar of some of our residents, following Citywide commencing its contract in July.

Missed collections are right down to between 20-30 out of tens of thousands of collections per day. Ninety per cent of those reports are being responded to within 24 hours.

While these results are very encouraging, we know there is more work to do and we are following up every reported missed collection to try and avoid it happening again.

We ask residents to report missed bin collections via the Snap Send Solve app. We are also working with the contractor on proper bin placement after they are emptied. This includes auditing Citywide to ensure this is happening as required under their contract.

This edition of Divercity has updates about the 2024 return of our fabulous St Kilda Festival and amazing St Kilda Film Festival. Pop these dates into your calendar so you don't miss out on these always anticipated events.

More immediately, our biggest ever Seniors Festival kicks off next month. I'm looking forward to seeing "the King" in action at the Elvis Presley tribute launching this jam-packed free program. Please take a look at what's on offer, there really is something for everyone.

Help us shape the St Kilda Triangle

Everyone can have their say about a proposed 5000 capacity stand-up indoor live music venue at the St Kilda Triangle site.

This follows a decision at a Port Phillip Council meeting to hold a six-week community consultation on the concept.

Closing at midnight on 19 October, the extensive consultation now underway includes a Have Your say survey and five pop-up events. Two drop-in sessions offer opportunities to speak in person to Council Officers about the design feasibility or the project generally and to provide feedback directly.

A report on potential next steps will be considered by Council towards the end of 2023 after the feedback has been considered.

Mayor Heather Cunsolo encouraged residents and music lovers to provide their views and insights about the proposal to activate this premium site.

"The existing carpark provides a 'blank canvas' for this concept, which reflects the site's history as the former home of entertainment venues including the Palais de Danse dance hall and Palace Nightclub," she said.

A range of music industry experts interviewed for the feasibility study said there is a gap in the market for an indoor venue of this size. The flexible design also allows functions of varying sizes to be held during the day when performances are not booked.

"Our detailed feasibility study included work on preliminary costings to ensure the concept is achievable. We believe it also reflects the spirit of the 2016 site Masterplan developed in consultation with our community.

"Now we need to hear what our community, traders and the live music industry think. We know there will be passionate views, from design to parking, and will carefully consider every comment."

The Council is taking every opportunity to hold discussions with potential partners, including the Victorian

Government, as a venue of this size would require funding support.

"The main focus at the moment, however, is testing the idea with our community and key stakeholders," Cr Cunsolo said.

St Kilda Festival set to turn it on in 2024

The St Kilda foreshore again plays host to the iconic St Kilda Festival (SKF) when Victoria's premier free live music event returns from 17-18 February, 2024.

Proudly presented by the City of Port Phillip, the Festival weekend will kick off with First Peoples First on

Day 1, celebrating First Nations music, art, and culture from morning to night on Saturday.



The event's traditional Big Festival Sunday follows on Day 2, offering a huge day of festivities and live performances from some of the biggest names in Australian music, taking to stages right around St Kilda.

Mayor Heather Cunsolo said the two-day format, which incorporated First Peoples First on Saturday in 2023, was a huge success in its inaugural year and attracted more than 375,000 live music lovers over the funfilled weekend.

"We're delighted First Peoples First is returning in 2024 as we again prepare to hold one of Australia's oldest music festivals," Cr Cunsolo said.

"More than 70 artists will be performing over two days at our 43rd SKF, with plenty of activations, community activities and family friendly entertainment also on offer. There really is something for everyone to enjoy."

The New Music Competition also returns as part of the Festival, giving 10 new and emerging bands and artists the opportunity to play a set of original music at the event. The winning act, as voted by the SKF audience, will take home a cash prize and a slot on the Main Stage at St Kilda Festival in 2025. Entries for the New Music Competition will open at 11 am on Monday 25 September.

EOI submissions for community groups looking to participate in the Festival, including local choirs, dance schools, performance collectives and more, can be made on the SKF website from 11 am on Monday 4 September until 5 pm on Monday 18 September. These will then be considered for the Big Festival Sunday program.

EOI submissions for local traders, including market stalls, food stalls and food trucks, can be made on the SKF website from 11 am on 11 September until 5 pm on Monday 2 October, 2023.

The annual SKF brings both cultural and economic benefits to the City of Port Phillip.

This much-loved event is part of Port Phillip's Council's continuing efforts to support economic recovery, especially for local businesses, as residents and visitors flock to enjoy all that St Kilda offers. More widely, the direct attendee impact was \$32.2 million for Victoria in 2023.

SKF also enhances St Kilda's reputation as a live music hub, further bolstered earlier this year when the Port Phillip Council declared parts of St Kilda as Victoria's first live music precinct.

Port Phillip's diverse community is also celebrated through the community component. Further details, including the full program, will be announced closer to the Festival.

Film entries are open for the 2024 St Kilda Film Festival, which will be celebrating 40 years of showcasing Australia's premier short filmmaking talent.

The new agreement with VicRoads will see our contractors maintain median strips on main roads such as Brighton Road, Beaconsfield Parade, Fitzroy Street, Bay Street and Williamstown Road.



Our Council receives funding from VicRoads to undertake parks maintenance, tree maintenance and street sweeping on specific land owned by VicRoads, such as median strips.

This directory primarily serves developers seeking an urban art contribution for projects exceeding two million dollars as part of the City of Port Phillip's percent for art scheme. We understand that developers often seek artist recommendations, and this directory allows us to maintain impartiality by providing them with a resource to explore artists independently. It also enables us to connect artists with upcoming expressions of interest and projects that align with their expertise. CoPP businesses searching for public art on their premises can also benefit from this directory.

Port Phillip knows how to FOGO

In May of this year, we commissioned a detailed audit of over 200 kerbside food and garden organics (FOGO) bins and over 200 garbage bins. The results show that on the whole, our community is enthusiastically and correctly adopting FOGO recycling.

In January of this year, we began rolling out kerbside food and garden organics (FOGO) recycling bins for houses and townhouses. Since then, we have seen an enthusiastic response



from our community, and we have conducted various bin audits to understand how our residents are using the service.

In May, we commissioned a detailed audit of 'matched' kerbside FOGO and garbage bins – meaning that the FOGO and garbage bin belong to the same household. The aim of this audit was to understand the extent to which the FOGO bin was being used and to uncover any contamination. We are pleased to report very encouraging results that demonstrate that our community is embracing food and garden organics recycling.

Very low contamination in FOGO bins

Contaminants are items that are not accepted in a particular kerbside bin as they interfere with the recycling of permitted items. These items have to be manually removed in order for FOGO recycling to take place successfully.

Of the bins that were audited in May, contamination was very low, at 1.5 per cent – this is a fantastic result and an acceptable rate for our processor. The audit showed that common contaminants in FOGO bins include ceramics, plastic bags and bio-packaging. These results tell us that while there is still some work to be done, most of our residents in houses and townhouses know how to properly use their FOGO bin.

FOGO materials recovery

This audit showed that our community has enthusiastically adopted FOGO. Our goal is to get to a point where all food and organic materials go in the FOGO bin, and our community has made a great start.

We learnt that on average, audited householders placed 74 per cent of FOGO materials into the correct bin. The audit also shows that residents are using the FOGO bins for almost all of their garden organics but for just under half of their food waste.

We know that our community care about recycling, so these results show that some people may need more guidance to use their FOGO bin for food waste specifically. We're using these audit results to create further resources to make this as easy as possible.

A reduction in kerbside garbage

Since the introduction of kerbside FOGO bins for houses and townhouses, we've seen a 58 per cent

reduction in FOGO materials inside audited garbage bins. As a result, garbage bin weight has reduced by 34 per cent on average. We expect this decline in garbage bin contents to continue as people become more familiar with FOGO recycling.

Sustainability survey - what we heard from you

We recently carried out a survey with the community to better understand the community's expectations of Council in addressing climate change and mitigating impacts, to explore your personal responses and sustainability actions and better understand concern around climate change.



Thank you to everyone who completed our sustainability survey recently. Your feedback is most appreciated and is already so valuable in many ways. The feedback has been shared across a range of departments in Council and is already being used to inform programs and services.

Importantly, feedback will also be incorporated into the final draft of the Act and Adapt Sustainability Strategy and our Climate Emergency plan. It will also be valuable input into other strategies and actions.

Here is a summary of what you told us:

- Overall concern about climate change and its predicted impacts was very high.
- You considered it extremely to very important that Council address each of nine issues relating to addressing climate change and sustainability.
- Many of you in the community are unaware of Council services to support the community adapt to climate change.
- · Majority of the community unaware Council declared a climate emergency.
- People report needing more information about how climate change will impact them to make informed decisions.
- Half of the community are already engaging in listed sustainability activities including avoiding single use plastics (93%), sourcing locally grown food (79%), using a special recycling service (73%), modifying heating or cooling to save energy (69%), reducing car use (65%), modifying home to reduce heat loss (62%), changing to renewable energy (51%), and preparing a plan to cope with extreme weather (48%).
- A substantial proportion of the community are considering solar panel/batteries and Electric Vehicle purchases in the next 5 years.
- Half of the community reported they would consider switching from gas to electric appliances.
- People were more focused on efficient use of water to save water, rather than the bigger and more complex interventions such as rainwater tanks.
- The main barriers to undertaking environmental actions were not being the property owner (40%), a lack of interest (21%) and cost (9%).
- Common factors that would encourage involvement in local environmental activities were more information about the activities available (63%), easier access to information (60%), and a better understanding of the local environment (43%).
- A large proportion of people reported reducing their personal car use because of the impact of climate change.
- The main factors encouraging people to use public transport more often were reduced cost, more frequent and better services and increased safety.
- Main factors encouraging people to walk or cycle more often were more cycling paths and tracks and separating cyclists from traffic.


Library Visit
